

Whilst recognising that drop-off and pick-up will always be a busy time, the Council and School ask for parental co-operation with the following points:

1. Erosion to the Green

The Council, who is responsible for the maintenance of the Green, requests that parents do not park on the Green or cut the corner at the entrance to the road which leads to the school. In turn, the Council is investigating ways of improving the parking available to staff and parents.

2. Turning round at the end of the road



The farm boundary, extends beyond its gates, needs to be kept clear and not used as a turning circle. Therefore, drivers are requested to use the area by the bridleway, marked by a star, to turn round and, thereby, not encroach into the farm boundary

3. Bridleway signage

Following reports from a number of villagers, the Countryside Officer has installed further signage at both ends of the bridleway. Unauthorised vehicles are not permitted to drive down the bridleway. Drivers should expect to be prosecuted if their vehicle was involved in an accident.

4. The Southern Track

The track which runs along the southern edge of the Green, is owned by The Queen's College, who grant right of access to the houses surrounding the Green. It is not a thoroughfare but is for the sole use of the residents, who are expected to pay for the upkeep of the track. Therefore, drivers must not use the track to access the school.

It is obviously important to minimise the impact of school traffic on those that live in and around the village. Given the very wet weather, seen this year, the Council and the School are keen to protect the Green as far as possible.
