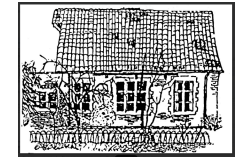


RE: Does it matter if a story is true or not?

Vocabulary

Philosophical	Thinking deeply about big, important questions that don't always have a simple answer. It is about wondering "Why?" and "How?" regarding the world and our lives.
Perception	The way you notice things using your senses and how your brain understands them. It is how you see the world, which might be different from how someone else sees it.
Literal	It means exactly what the words say. There are no hidden meanings or exaggerations. It is the simple, factual truth.
Metaphorical	Words to describe something by comparing it to something else. It isn't actually true in real life, but it helps paint a picture in someone's mind.
Moral	Something that you learn from a story. It can teach you about what is right and wrong, or how to behave to be a good person. You usually find the moral at the very end of a story.
Proverb	A short, well-known sentence that gives advice or shares a piece of wisdom. These are sayings that people have used for a very long time to help explain life.
Fable	A short, made-up story that is written to teach a moral . The characters in fables are often animals that can talk and act like humans.
Worldview	The unique way you see and understand the world around you.

Key Knowledge

- Metaphorical means to represent words - to stand for or symbolise something else
